The national General Assembly is a crucial moment to gather all members in-person, to discuss strategy and priority issues, to learn from each other and facilitate exchanges on the future of the network.


The workshop was co-organized on November 29, 2022 by GRET, Maeying Houamjai Phathana (MHP), CLICK, Rural Development Agency (RDA), National University of Laos-Faculty of Agriculture (NUoL-FAG), as part of the ASSET project funded by the French Agency for Development (AFD), the European Union (EU), and the French Facility for Global Environment (FFEM).

## 1. Workshop Objectives and Participants

The National General Assembly aims to present the key achievements of the network in 2022, consult members on internal structure and discuss the main action plan for the network in 2023 (see the workshop agenda in annex 1).

1. To welcome the new national secretariat and new members of 2022;
2. To present and share ALiSEA progress activities of 2022 and updates on grant organizations of the call for proposal 2022 from ALiSEA Small Grant Facility;
3. To consult members on the different scenarios of the internal structure;
4. To present and consult members on the ALiSEA Communication Strategy and action plan;
5. To share the results of the national foresight and theory of change workshop (held in October, 2022) and consult members on the main action for 2023.

The event brought together 34 organizations, 39 participants including 18 women of the ALiSEA network, working in the field of agroecology across the country, such as local and international nongovernmental organizations, private sectors, networks, academic and government institutions (see participants list in annex 2).

## 2. Introduction Session

The workshop began with the opening remarks and a warm welcome to all participants from Mr Phouthasinh Phimmachanh, Director of CLICK *“I am very proud and glad to be a representative of the ALiSEA Network that was established in 2015. Since that time, our members have become more diverse, with various stakeholders from the private sector and farmers' groups. We have been unable to meet in person for such a long time, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, and had to meet online instead. However, today is a wonderful opportunity to meet in person, to review the achievements of the past years, and to consult and discuss our short- and long-term strategies and action plans for the upcoming year. Without further ado, I would like to formally warmly welcome all participants, along with my best wishes for a fruitful and successful workshop. The national General Assembly is officially open.”*

Then, Ms Chintanaphone Keovichith (CLICK) continued to present about “the ALiSEA main achievements in 2022 and progress activities” [The complete presentation is available here](#)

Special speech from Mrs. Vansy Senyavong (MHP) who took the opportunity to say “goodbye” as ALiSEA national Board Member on policy dialogue coordinator. *“The General Assembly Workshop will be my last workshop to involve as ALiSEA policy dialogue coordinator. In fact, I actually do not want to leave this role, because the policy is very important. If we talk about the network, we are thinking about linking production, income, marketing and policy and where the policy has gotten stuck. It is important to have someone who can continue. I’ve been in this position since April 2021, and it’s been a full year and a half, and I may move forward to other work on policy dialogue sections. I have been travelling to 17 provinces across the country. In addition, I joined the ALiSEA internal regional policy dialogue meeting for sharing experience among Laos, Vietnam and Cambodia. I am happy to give advice on policy dialogue in the future. Consequently, I would like to return this role to GRET and another member interested to join the board members.”*

### **Explanation of the selection process related to the Policy Dialogue Position was conducted by Ms Manivanh Aliyavong (GRET)**

The Policy dialogue position is open to all ALiSEA members and interested organization should contact Manivanh Aliyavong.

Next step for the selection of the policy dialogue, will be interview the candidates and discussed and the decision will be made by the national ALiSEA Board Member and GRET.

### **3. Small Grant Call 2022 Results and Next call**

The regional and national results and lessons learned from the Small Grant call for proposal 2022 were presented by Ms Manivanh Aliyavong (GRET Laos). [The complete presentation is available here](#)

For this call, we received 22 proposals in total allocated: 9 proposals from Laos, 7 from Vietnam and 6 from Cambodia. The ALiSEA network was pleased to announce the 2 awarded members of the 2022 call in Laos:

- CLICK: Link and learn agroecology from the field.

The objective is to capitalize the best agro-ecological practices, as to capture, assess, share and learn by members of ALiSEA, Lao Farmer Network and Department of Agriculture Extension and Cooperative.

The challenges, main actions and expected results for dissemination of “Link and learn agroecology from the field” was presented by Mr Phouthasinh Phimmachanh, [The complete presentation is available here](#)

- CDEA: Promotion of renewable energy into agriculture post harvesting for smallholders.

The objective is to ensure food security via environmentally friendly solutions and to test **renewable energy in post-harvesting practices to improve economic benefit and livelihood of small scale farmers.**

Following the presentation, all participants were asked to vote for the below four points with the answer “Yes”, “No” and “No Idea”.



1. Welcome individual people based on specific criteria and set up specific role;
2. Welcome specialized journalists’/media organization as member;
3. Set up 2 status/roles for members;
4. Renew membership every 5 years.

As a result, the majority of participants voted in favor of the points above.



#### Comments and discussion:

- Is it necessary to host individual as a member of ALiSEA network? Because the challenge is how we can support, collaborate with them and how they can contribute when they participate to ALiSEA network meeting?

- It is not necessary to bring specializing journalists organizations on agriculture to become members, we can provide the articles to them to disseminate and invite them when we organized important events.
- To gather the information and result of the ALiSEA network activity to scaling up and communicate widely, so the journalists will be the one who can capture and promote our work on Agroecology.

In the next section, participants exchanged and shared opinions on the three potential scenarios of ALiSEA's structure (See the three structure scenarios below). The objective of this section was to initiate discussions and collect suggestions, questions and possible concerns from members on internal structuration and governance of the ALiSEA Network. This is a long-term process; therefore, no decision will be taken at the end of this General Assembly.

#### Advantages:

- The ALiSEA national Board Members (BM) have clear role, and high responsibility and work as a team. Members should get all information
- Encourages teamwork
- Advertise activities of farmers and members


#### Disadvantages:

- Low benefit or financial contribution (20%) according to workload, we have a lot of work and members in the network
- For the Small grant, there is only one Lao evaluator among the selection committee, so judges could be wayed or biased due to language barriers and misunderstandings
- Currently, GRET is only one regional committee in our network, putting us at risk; if GRET completes their mission in Laos, what will we do with ALiSEA network?
- At the international level, no representative from our network have joined and shared our experiences and views

Comments:

- All documentation, strategies, and information should be translated into Lao in order to increase the knowledge of teams and facilitate better understanding.
- Lao BM has to join evaluation committee for small grant selection in collaboration with GRET (regional, national)
- All BM should be part of the small grant selection committee.
- Should increase financial contribution and time of involvement from 20% to suitable amount (30%-40%) according to real tasks or work of BM
- Add the involvement of technical staff in case a Director has been selected to join the BM by the vote at regional level to assist GRET in managing ALiSEA network
- We should separate tasks between BM and national secretariats. BM supervise secretariat work

**SCENARIO N2: Focus on strong regional dimension**



Advantages:

- Raise our voice and be representative of ALiSEA members at the regional level
- Increase decision-making power for each country. Each country can send their representative to join regional network
- We can save the budget by selecting 3-4 members from each country to exchange information in a regional workshop, the idea to send one representative to join the regional mission
- It is more sustainable than scenario 1 if GRET ended its mission in Laos. BM and members of the Network can manage ALiSEA and continue raising their own funds.
- Increase the opportunity to access funding because ALiSEA members are also members of other networks (IFOAM, Asian Farmers Association, AsiaDHRRRA etc.)


Disadvantage:

- There is no selection of the steering committee of the Secretariat

Comments:

- Regional committee should include representative from other countries
- GRET can be secretariat and support to the committee decision,
- We should have president of ALiSEA network who is selected by the members
- We should have 3 external volunteers board committee for consult (select for all ALiSEA member)
- BM should have time to work more than 30%
- We should have Board Member from national and regional levels (select 3-5-7 members) drawn from all members to make decision to vote (odd number)
- Select country president to join regional Board Member

**SCENARIO N3 - Focus on national dynamics (Alliance)**



Advantages:

- We have our own organization or Board Member
- We can focus on our own strategies, according to our culture, tradition and country condition. We can develop suitable working plans
- Management system is easier
- We can increase capacity building for our team (Board Member, farmers and members)
- The source of fund will be increase
- Increase more chances to access funding or small grants and less competition from overseas
- We will ignore regional sustainability
- We can ensure Board Member selection from members

Disadvantages:

- Increased workload of Board Member and secretariat

- If we did not have regional Board Member, available funds will decrease because donors promote multinational collaboration
- Lack of collaborative planning, not suitable to needs, condition of country members (in the past, the plan had been developed by Board Member)
- No regional projects (lack of funding and unable to create regional policy)

**Comments:**

- Increasing the number of Board Member members will reduce workload of the team (increased efficiency, clear roles, providing suitable benefit)
- We could have 5 people to form part of the Board Member (Small Grant position in Laos)
- We should keep regional Board Member because we can increase funds that can be distributed to national BM or ALiSEA member
- There is no Board Member for small grant. This grant selection will be conducted by members in the country.
- Strategies and all documents should be translated into Lao. The strategies should be suitable for Lao culture, traditions, methods and local contexts. We should have an annual evaluation and monitoring, which will help us to improve.
- We should have fundraising specialist on the team and ensure they are skilful in raising money
- Technical team like Fund raising should be created, the person should have good skill in English and full-time staffs
- We should have management task like finance, administrative management (minimum fund to manage ALiSEA)

**What can we do between now to 2025 to prepare for what happens after the project ends?**

- Start to improve the organizational structure, ensure ownership, play a role together, manage, work to find funds for the network for the sustainability of the network
- Financial sustainability of the network by itself (members should help each other to find sources of funds, write project proposals)
- Drafting of the Board Member role including management, and to find extra funds for the network
- Hold a special meeting to discuss the details again


**Way Forward: Next steps to reach a decision on Scenario**

- 1) Consolidate and Build on feedback and recommendations made at the General Assembly in the 3 countries: Cambodia, Laos, Vietnam (November 2022 – January 2023)
- 2) Online Regional Webinar to invite other existing Networks to share their experience and suggestions (tentatively April 2023):  
e.i: AFA, Earth Net, Education for Environment, WOCAT
- 3) Working Sessions between the national Board Members of 3 countries to develop a proposal (February to June 2023)
- 4) Present proposals and take decision at the Regional General Assembly (tentatively October 2023)

## 5. ALiSEA Communication Strategy

## 6. Taking Action for ALiSEA next activities program

The results of the national foresight and theory of change workshop held in October 2022, was presented by Mr. Sayvisene Boulom (NUoL, FAG). His presentation highlighted the objectives, participants and approach of the workshop, including results on present and future status of agroecology in Laos, transition pathways and expected results of the workshop. The majority of participants voted for the three (3) priority pathways listed below:

1. Increasing knowledge from national and international exchanges. Youth moving back to Laos to start Agroecology farm business;
2. Limited technical capacity of smallholders, farmer organizations, technicians for AE, SF and marketing/ Increasing trend of AE/SF products due to increased middle class, food safety knowledge, and health problems
3. Poor management of agricultural chemical use.

**After the above three priority pathways were selected, the participants continued the discussion in the plenary to identify and propose activities for ALiSEA in 2023. Members highlighted the following main activities:**

1. Increasing knowledge from national and international exchanges. Youth moving back to Laos to start Agroecological farm business:
  - Establish Agroecology learning center and curriculum
  - Support young farmers
  - Establish Agroecology revolving fund
  - Organize workshop between farmers to farmers
  - Raise awareness among youth and young families interested in agriculture
  - Promote market access for AE products
  - Produce stories from the field (Video, Photo, online media).
  - Create social media (Tiktok) and promote Agroecology to farmers
2. Limited technical capacity of smallholders, farmer organizations, technicians for AE, SF and marketing/ Increasing trend of AE/SF products due to increased middle class, food safety knowledge, and health problems:
  - Organize training session for farmers on Agriculture technical knowledge, nutrition, safe food production and, marketing
  - Support Agroecology farming family model in community
  - Organize Study tour about family model

3. Poor management of agricultural chemical use.
  - Organize a discussion workshop between government agencies, farmers, CSOs on pesticide use and how to limit the importation of chemical inputs.
  - Organize training session on the harmful effects of chemicals inputs use targeting producer groups and consumers.
  - Support by the small grant the Agroecology demonstration center by selecting existing farmer's model.
  - Organize Study tour at the Agroecology demonstration center (to exchange between the chemical user and non-users).

**Comment:** To consolidate the results of promoting Agroecology in Laos to 2040, this could be a policy brief of about 3 pages and share it with the government, donors, stakeholders in order to widely disseminate it.

## 7. Conclusion

The national General Assembly has been rich and fruitful venue that paves the way for the internal structure and governance of the network, as well as taking decisions on the priority issues to be addressed by the network and main activities to be implemented in 2023.

As a way forward:

- Take action on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Small Grants call for proposal selected and expand/adapt the 3 pathways selected to be the topic for the next call for 2023
- Update the rule and the role of members
- Pilot of the internal structure and action
- At national level, the ALiSEA Board Members will develop a detailed action plan for the network building upon the discussions and outcomes of the General Assembly
- At regional level, the first Regional General Assembly workshop will be organized in 2023 to take decision on the structuration and organization.
