

Challenges




Green Earth Centre

Objective:

GEC aims to become a leading training and research centre on community- based production, processing and marketing in order to directly support and improve smallholder farming households through providing appropriate technical support and linking them to the markets.

Three Components:

- 1. Demonstration Centre: improved knowledge on production and processing of agricultural products as well as improved agroforestry techniques for forest products
- Integration of smallholders into markets: linking farmers to businesses and participating in product value-adding activities.
- Capacity Development: for multiple stakeholder groups on appropriate agroecological techniques as well as land and NRM.



Demonstrations & Integrated Farming Approach

- The GEC looks at ways to enhance biodiversity in farming, and make use of land in a sustainable manner to enhance people's livelihoods.
- GEC tests and demonstrates effective methods for:
 - organic fruit and vegetable farming;
 - animal husbandry, including organic poultry, pigs, goats, fish, frogs, earthworms;
 - productive soil testing and composting;
 - mushroom production;
 - processing agroforestry products (wine, juice, jam, dried fruit);
 - growing sweet potatoes, peanuts and corn for animal feed.


Lessons learnt

- Farmers need visible demonstrations in order to take chances
- Demonstrations must be replicable, must be and culturally and economically appropriate for villages
- Training materials must consider local capacities and realities
- Farmers are seeking new or enhanced livelihood opportunities
- Bringing farmers together from different villages enhances lessons and creates shared opportunities
- Forest and natural resource stewardship is enhanced when farmers recognize the economic value of non timber forest products
- Smallholder farmers do not typically benefit from large-scale or 'modern' agriculture investment (e.g. chemical use, mechanization, etc.): Green Earth Centre offers an alternative to this
- Smallholder farmers need access to information and knowledge about land tenure issues, contracts, appropriate and local/customary agriculture strategies, the benefits of local knowledge, etc. to help them be resilient in the face of large-scale agriculture and market volatility (e.g. cash crops)

Key Issues

- Funding limitations
- Capacity limitations
- The need for provincial-level and national-level buy-in
- Need to increase, enhance and deepen networks and partnerships
- Need to strengthen knowledge and connection to markets
- General strategic and center management

Future of GEC

- GEC is an locally-focused training center providing agricultural expertise and practical activities to transfer knowledge to local communities
- Strong partnerships with local authorities
- Learning from other organisations and encourage private sector (agribusinesses) to better engage with communities
- As our name implies, Village Focus International always starts our work at village level to understand them and find ways to support them
- Successful farmers become our trainers within FFS approaches
- In general, local people want improve livelihoods: this is challenging but we can help them to understand how to choose and implement appropriate and applicable agroecological approaches
